

### THE AMERICAS, GEORGIA EXPERIENCE

"If you don't tell your story, someone else will." – Carmine Gallo. One of the major projects of our Grand Lodge historical team is to record and tell our history from every part of the state. One of the first stops on this project was in the city of Americus.

Before arriving in Americus, Georgia, I spoke with DDGM Gary Felder and informed him that I planned on coming to Americus to document various historical sites and graves there. I also asked him about other sites of historical significance to Prince Hall Masonry in the Great State of Georgia. He then told me about a brother whom I needed to speak with who had a vast knowledge of Americus, and his name was PM Joe Clark.

I met PM Clark at the home of St. John Lodge #17. He gave me a tour of the building and explained the cornerstones that were on the building. One of the cornerstones showed that the lodge had been established on June 26, 1872, with Reverend Charles Bradwell as its first Worshipful Master. Reverend Charles Bradwell was one of the leading African Methodist Episcopal Ministers in the state during his life. According to an article in the Voice of Missions, on February 1, 1900, during his time as pastor in Americus, 200 members were added to his church!

After the lodge tour, PM Clark drove me around town to several sites. He showed me some of the properties owned by the Grand Lodge at one time and gave me fascinating stories about previous times in Americus. He informed me that he had been a Mason since 1969. To help put this in perspective, the Grand Master at that time was Dr. X.L. Neal. He had only been Grand Master for 7 years when PM Clark became a Mason. PGM Neal would go on to serve for another 21 years until 1990. PM Clark has been a Mason longer than I've been alive, and I was truly in awe of his dedication.

After visiting the properties, we went to the site of our old orphan home. The Orphans Home at Americus was brought into existence via a resolution that the Grand Lodge passed during the session from June 22-24, 1899. This home was the vision of PGM William Edward Terry, and its main building would be named after him later. For many years, the Grand Lodge would meet annually there. As we passed the location, we discussed how it must have looked for so many members to be in that area during the late 1800's. We talked about how members would come to town via the train and stay with other members because they wouldn't have been allowed to stay in too many hotels, if any. Brotherhood would have taken on an entirely different meaning in those days.

Next we went to Everview Cemetery. PM Clark informed me that many past members were buried there, and we would visit their graves. One of the first graves that we visited was the grave of Past Grand Worthy Matron Viola Hart-Felton. PGWM Hart-Felton was born on April 11, 1870, and passed away in office on March 31, 1933. She was a staple in the Americus community and our Grand Chapter.



While at her grave, we discussed various historical facts about her. One thing that we talked about is that she and PGM Dr. Henry Rutherford Butler Sr. shared a birthday. PGM Butler was born 8 years before her on April 11, 1862. After leaving her grave, we visited the grave of Past District Deputy Grand Master Lee Andrew Fuse. We sat down for a few minutes, and PM Clark began to talk about PDDGM Fuse's life. He spoke about how he was related to him and how great of a man and a Mason he was.

As he reflected on PDDGM Fuse's life, I couldn't help but wish I had the opportunity to meet him, too, and I know that the Jurisdiction suffered a tremendous loss when he passed away. Upon leaving the cemetery, we visited the old Americus Colored Hospital. This hospital opened in 1923 and was open to all races. According to the historical marker, it allowed black nurses and doctors to practice in an actual hospital because it was open to all races. I began researching this hospital and found a vast reception to celebrate that occasion when it opened.

One of the day's speakers was Past Master Alfred Samuel Staley, a local minister and educator in Americus. He has a middle school named after him and was also a St. John Lodge #17 member. Afterward, we walked across the street to look at Campbell's Chapel AME Church, organized in 1877. We then visited many more sites in Americus, including the former home of PGWM Viola Hart-Felton.

We finished our tour back at the lodge where PM Clark reiterated how important our history is and how many great things had happened in Americus. I would like to thank PM Clark for taking time out of his day to show me around and give me a one-of-a-kind tour of Americus. PM Clark is a walking history book and an absolute gem in our organization. Also, I would like to give a special thank you to DDGM Gary Felder for making this tour happen.


